Will you please send me a copy of your article "Human Toxoplasmosis--A Critical Review", the Sixth William Hamlin Wilder Memorial Lecture in the American Journal of Ophthalmology, Volume 41, Page 600, 1956.

As a pediatrician, I find it very easy to obtain dye test studies for toxoplasmosis in newborn infants. However, as you have outlined in this article, there are other entities which we often overlook, but may suspect. The Public Health Service does not accept agglutination studies for such cases. Would your department have any suggestions for further study beyond physical findings in patients with a syndrome similar to infectious mononucleosis, for instance, but no evidence of heterophile antibody rise, or for patients with chorioretinitis but no evidence of the other granulomatous illnesses?
