Many thanks for your recent letter and the information concerning meals and hotel facilities.

As to your questions; enamel trays or pans of any size nearing the measurements I gave you will suffice. Actually size is relatively unimportant and the ones you have will do very nicely.

The earthenware bowls were also just a suggestion in case metal pans were difficult to obtain. The glazed custard jars will facilitate ova removal and are easy to clean.

The batting caps are used for the transferring of mosquitoes from cage to cage. However, as you cannot obtain them, I will bring along some rubber dam which we can use in their place.

Any other equipment that we will need right away, I will make and bring along with me.

I will also send sufficient ova to get a good start and I have made arrangements with the National Institute of Health to save their extra ova for us. In this way we will take care of any unforeseen emergencies that may arise and we will be assured of a good colony.
