Dear Harry:

Needless to say, I was glad to learn of your expected visit here on January 20. I shall look forward to it. In view of the fact that I live within one minute's drive of the Winton Place Station of Cincinnati, which is also very close to the laboratory, I was wondering whether or not you would be coming in from New York and, therefore, be passing through this station. If you are coming from New York, may I suggest that it would give me great pleasure to pick you up in the morning at the Winton Place Station and have you at our house for breakfast. You could then go on to your other appointment, and we could make arrangements for the remainder of the day as may be indicated. Your departure would also be more advantageous from the Winton Place Station.

Having recently gone over all the data on our work with the 8-aminoquinoline compounds, I think that the conference originally considered with the people who are most familiar with this group of compounds, regarding the question of further exploitation with regard to poliomyelitis, is very desirable.
